1	financial records and was determind to	<p>The correct answer is 'financial records and was determind to'.</p> <p>The word 'determind' is spelled incorrectly. The correct spelling is 'determined', with an 'e' after the 'n'.</p> <p>All other words in the sentence are spelled correctly, so the only mistake is in the group of words 'financial records and was determind to'.</p>	1
2	brush	<p>The correct answer is 'brush'.</p> <p>The sentence is in the past tense, as indicated by the phrase 'Every morning' and the word 'would'. Therefore, the verb 'brush' is the most appropriate choice for this sentence.</p>	1
3	as	<p>The correct answer is 'as'.</p> <p>In this sentence, 'as' is used as a conjunction to introduce a clause that explains the reason for the audience's enthusiastic applause. It indicates that the applause occurred at the same time as the magician's performance of the incredible illusion.</p> <p>'Due to' and 'because' are used to introduce a cause or reason, but they do not imply the same timing as 'as' does in this context. 'Since' can be used to refer to a point in time, but it does not convey the simultaneous nature of the two events as clearly as 'as' does.</p> <p>Therefore, 'as' is the most appropriate choice to complete the sentence correctly.</p>	1
4	The magishun's enchanted wand	<p>The correct answer is 'The magishun's enchanted wand'.</p> <p>The word 'magishun' is a misspelling of the word 'magician'.</p> <p>The correct spelling is:</p> <p>The magician's enchanted wand glittered mysteriously, illuminating the ancient tome.</p> <p>All other words in the sentence are spelled correctly, and the sentence structure is grammatically correct.</p>	1
5	enthusiastic participant	<p>The correct answer is 'enthusiastic participant'.</p> <p>The word 'participant' is spelled incorrectly in the sentence. The correct spelling is 'participant', with an 'i' after the 'c'.</p> <p>All other parts of the sentence are spelled correctly, so 'enthusiastic participant' is the only group of words containing a spelling mistake.</p>	1
6	was fascinated by the misterious	<p>The correct answer is 'was fascinated by the misterious'.</p> <p>The word 'misterious' is spelled incorrectly. The correct spelling is 'mysterious', with a 'y' instead of an 'i' after the 'm'.</p> <p>The rest of the sentence is grammatically correct and contains no other spelling errors.</p>	1

7	painted a portrait of the King a stunning	<p>The correct answer is 'painted a portrait of the King a stunning'.</p> <p>This group of words contains a mistake in the form of a missing punctuation mark. There should be a comma (,) after 'King' to introduce the description of the portrait as 'a stunning likeness'.</p>	1
8	began	<p>The correct answer is 'began'.</p> <p>In this sentence, we need the past tense form of the verb 'begin' to indicate that the action of searching started in the past, after the discovery of the missing cat.</p> <p>'Begins' is the present tense form, which does not fit the context. 'Begun' is the past participle form, which is used with auxiliary verbs like 'had' or 'have'. 'Beginning' is the present participle form, which is used with auxiliary verbs like 'am', 'is', or 'are'.</p> <p>Therefore, 'began' is the only correct option that properly completes the sentence in the past tense.</p>	1
9	vigorously chased its tale	<p>The correct answer is 'vigorously chased its tale'.</p> <p>The word 'tale' is incorrectly used in this sentence. 'Tale' refers to a story, whereas 'tail' is the correct spelling for the long, flexible appendage at the rear end of an animal's body.</p> <p>The sentence should read: 'The curious puppy vigorously chased its tail, running in circles around the garden.'</p>	1
10	audience	<p>The correct answer is 'audience'.</p> <p>A collective noun is a word that refers to a group of people, animals, or things. In this sentence, 'audience' is a collective noun because it refers to a group of people who are watching or listening to a performance.</p> <p>'Applauded' is a verb, 'choir's' is a possessive noun, and 'performance' is a singular noun, but none of these are collective nouns.</p>	1
